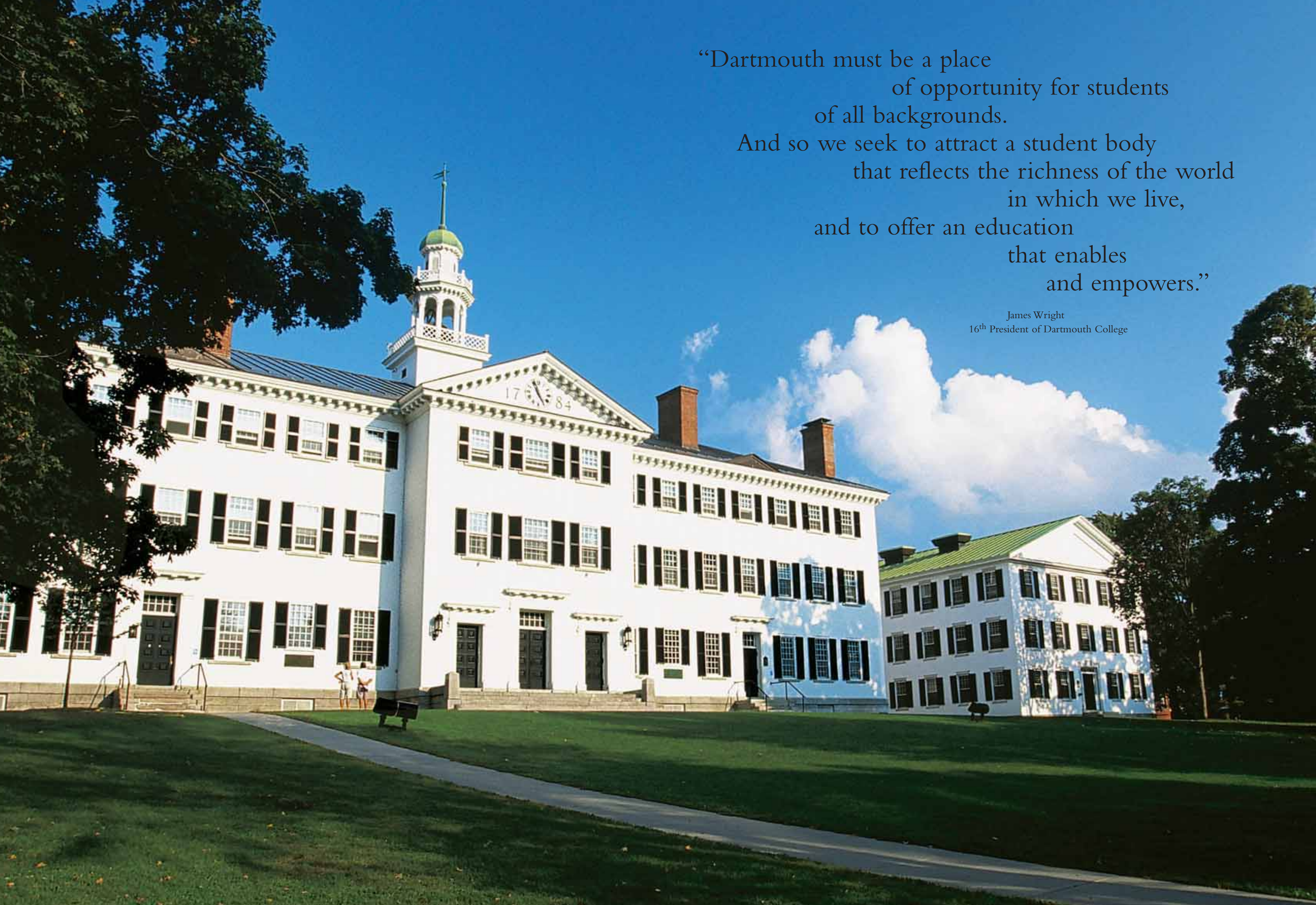

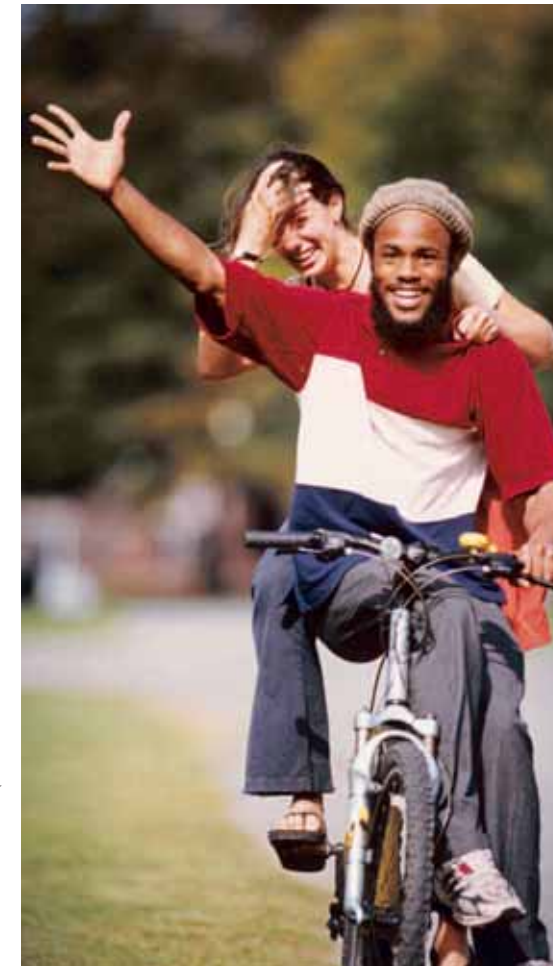

In addition, my international student mentor and UGA (Undergraduate Advisor) graciously answered my many questions without making me feel ignorant. For example, the first time I did my laundry, I had no idea how to use the washers and dryers. This was kind of embarrassing, but my UGA patiently taught me step-by-step.

Another great resource is the Academic Skills Center. They helped me refine my study skills, structure my time efficiently, write effectively, and stressed the importance of relationships with professors and administrators.

Dartmouth provides an incredible array of resources to help students adjust, and the school has become my second home.

**“My favorite class to teach? International Relations of Asia. We bring in speakers from the first Bush Administration, former ambassadors... it’s lively. The issues I’m researching are important right now. North Korea needs to be understood. This is one of the things I’m writing about, speaking about, teaching.”**

His laugh bounces down the hall of the Government Department so frequently that his colleagues have asked—nicely—that he keep it down.
