Student Conduct at Dartmouth

Values

Dartmouth strives to cultivate an environment conducive to the achievement of learning, research, and intellectual exploration. The value of the education that can be earned here is dependent on academic honor and personal integrity. We expect our students to be actively responsible citizens of this community, to respect the rights of others, and to hold each other accountable for behavior that is corrosive to our community values, harms oneself, or harms another. Our standards of conduct and the work of this office exist to promote a safe and secure environment in which your student can learn and achieve.

When will you hear from us?

If your student is classified as a dependent, the Judicial Affairs Office will notify you if your student is placed on probation after an administrative-level hearing. Judicial Affairs will also notify you if your student is alleged to have behaved in a manner that may result in suspension or separation (i.e. expulsion). All suspension-level cases are heard by the Committee on Standards (COS). At the conclusion of the COS process, the Judicial Affairs Office will notify you of the outcome.

Summary of Dartmouth's Standards of Conduct

- I. Students may not cause or threaten physical harm to another person.
- II. Students may not threaten the safety, security or functioning of others or the College.
- III. Sexual misconduct of any kind is prohibited.
- IV. Students shall abide by the Alcohol and Drug Policy.
- V. Students shall abide by the Academic Honor Principle.
- VI. Students may not violate the laws of any jurisdiction.
- VII. Students must abide by College policies, rules, and regulations.
- VIII. Students must not disrupt, interfere with, or obstruct teaching, research, or College administration.
- IX. Students must comply with the directives of College officials and shall not make false statements.

What can parents do?

- 1) Openly discuss your family values and expectations for behavior and treatment of others.
- 2) Encourage your student to make responsible decisions about drugs and alcohol.
- 3) Help your student identify areas of stress or poor time management habits. Students who violate the Academic Honor Principle often report time pressures or academic stress.
- 4) Set reasonable expectations for academic achievement.
- 5) Leave BB guns, knives, and alcohol at home.
- 6) Encourage your student to seek help when needed.
