LIMITS AND EXCLUSIONS

- HIST 7, 98 and HIST 99 may not count towards the 10-course Standard Major.
- Students may include not more than two of the following (HIST 1, 2 or 3).
- Seminars have limited enrollment. Contact the instructor ASAP to ensure that you can reserve a place.
- Students may not use more than 2 upper-class seminars (HIST 96) or more than 2 Independent Study Projects (HIST 97) in satisfying the requirements of the major.
- At least 5 courses must be taken in residence in Hanover, including the upper-level seminar.

ABOUT THE HONORS PROGRAM

- Participation in the History Honors program is by invitation of the department. Qualifying students enroll in HIST 98 in the Fall term of their senior year, and write a thesis (HIST 99) over the Winter and Spring terms. (A one-term thesis is rare but possible.)
- HIST 98 and 99 (the Honors Seminar and Thesis) are in addition to the 10-course Standard Major
