#### News from the Otters

Can you believe that we are already in November?! I know we sure can't. This year we have a super fun, kind, loving group. These Otters are energetic, eager, and forward driven. We have worked on so many different developmental skills already in the few short months we've had.

The Otters are between the age of 2.5 and 3 years. This is a time of transitions, and big emotions for our kiddos. We call this the "threenager" stage. This is when they find new emotions and a BIG sense of independence, but don't quite know how to handle them yet. So, we have been working on a few tools to help us properly express our emotions toward our friends along with giving our emotions a label.





One of the skills we are working is grasping what emotion we are feeling we are having in that moment. Using that emotion in the age appropriate manner and then checking in with our friends to see how they are feeling as well.

One thing in the Otter room that we really push for is allowing the kids to figure things out for themselves. For example, there are so many new things to explore in the classroom, it can be hard to share. If one child takes an item from another child, and it can be resolved amongst themselves, we as the teachers allow them. We like to only step in if the problem cannot be handled on their

Alternatives to yelling no or pushing our friends away are:

"You can have it when I'm done".

"We can use them together"

own.

"There is another one over there you can have"

When we do need to step in, we give them the tools to do it on their own rather than make our own decision for the kids. Natural consequences work in the same way. If you are playing at the table with your milk cup, it may spill on to your clothes. However, if you leave the milk cup on the table and drink it without playing, its less likely to spill. There's no reason to cry over spilt milk, but we talk about what could or would have happened if we had not been playing and focused on eating.

For the month of November, we are working on "Filling our Buckets". To fill someone's bucket is to do something kind for them without persuasion. Such as giving them a hug, helping someone clean up their station, getting a friend their water bottle and so much more. We have a bulletin board we will be creating into a bucket to chart our progress.

This works as a cause and effect scale.

Over the past few months we have been welcoming our Badgers in the morning with a variety of options for table choices or open floor activities. The transition into the Badger room went smoothly for everyone. It was a pretty happy transition.

We are working on fine motor skills like cutting, gluing, and painting. Our classroom is filled with the artwork the children have created while working on these skills! We have also been hard at work on our social skills. At the beginning of the school year, they often take things from their friends without asking and cry for help. We are already seeing a little difference with this. We have them ask their peers a question and the other peer will answer with eye contact. Modeling, sharing, taking turns. Recognizing our emotions and others. We have also seen our friends become much stronger in their problem solving skills like spatial reasoning. We see this in everyday activities like solving puzzles, putting their lunch boxes away or getting bikes out from the shed when they're stuck.

As we stepped into fall we cut apples, added some extra goodies and made our own applesauce and enjoyed it for a snack. We had large pumpkins and all helped decide on what kind of jack-o-lantern they wanted carved, we all scooped out the seeds and the goop inside. We had a chance to feel the pumpkin. Some of our badgers enjoyed it and some said "I don't think so!" We will be roasting them and comparing before and after. We worked together peeling corn on the cob. Some took turns with the cob and some peeled it together. We then painted them. We loved painting our own mini pumpkins to take home!

We picked colorful leaves while out for walks and on the playground. They enjoyed using them for art and crumbling them in a sensory bin. There was a lot of raking going on outside and jumping into the piles of the leaves. We all enjoyed listening to the leaves crunch under our feet as we walked.

We are looking forwad the next quarter watching the Badgers blossom even more!

#### News from the Black Bears

Our first couple months in the Black Bear room have been very exciting and fun! Since this year our classroom is mixed up with children ages 3-5, this has posed some behavioral struggles but overall it has been a beautiful sight to see how much the older children love and care for the younger kids. We often say in the classroom that the older kids are role models and they are beginning to take this job very seriously. As we know, the younger kids are just learning how to express their thoughts and identify their feelings in a positive way- and the older children continue to help them along the way.

The Black Bears have had a blast learning about their favorite topics with our emergent curriculum and exploring the outdoors. Some of the favorite topics explored so far were our Superhero week in which we made our own capes & our Community Helpers and Transportation week. During Community Helpers week we got to have a medical student and the Fire & Police department come visit us to share with us what they do, show us their tools & equipment and answer questions the kids created. The children even got to explore the fire and police vehicles- making themselves cozy in the front seat. During our Transportation week, we got to have a line service technician from the granite airport come to visit. During this visit, children explored the tools used to stay safe & communicate w/ other technicians and pilots. The children even got to pretend to park a plane with the wands & speak code in the walkie talkie. The children came up with some wonderful questions during these visits and had a blast getting to meet these people in person.

We have done a number of science experiments and have really enjoyed making predictions and exploring cause and effect. Children also have made great observations about why the experiment resulted in the way it did. Some favorite experiments thus far include a fall sink or float activity, making pumpkin volcanoes, and friction/speed exploration with a variety of ramps.













Music and games are another huge favorite in the classroom. We sing a variety of interactive songs related to the week's theme each Wednesday and play a handful of games each week related to the theme as well.

The Black Bears have loved using the multi for big body play during the week and have really enjoyed our writing & alphabet workshops each week. Children continue to smile ear to ear and giggle with excitement when they complete each letter and are eager to learn how to write more letters and even words. All the older children can completely write their names and the younger children are learning this skill very quickly. Each week, with each theme, children get to practice tracing or writing words related to the theme using word cards. We also do a lot of letter sound identification with sound songs and constructing letters with a variety of materials. It's been great sharing this workshop time w/ the kids and seeing how much fun they're having gaining this skill.

Black bears have also enjoyed celebrating each other's birthdays and engaging in holiday

activity. We had a blast with the Black Bear Halloween dance party, costume contest & treat exchange- as well as the center wide Trunk or Treat event. Believe it or not we have already celebrated birthdays and have lots of birthdays coming up this month. We look forward to our Thanksgiving Feast event & Holiday Caroling Concert that is soon to come.

The journey thus far has been a blast and we can't wait to see what else this year brings.
