### From the Director

Welcome to 2023 at D4C! The staff has pulled together yet again to bring you a newsletter full of fun facts, great pictures, and loads of developmental knowledge. Our aim in providing these quarterly newsletters is to give you a glimpse into the life and development of all our classrooms. I know that you get information daily about your child's classroom, but the quarterly newsletter gives you a peek into what is yet to come or perhaps takes you on a walk down memory lane. It can be amazing to see pictures of babies and read about what they are doing when your child is now 4 years old and doing so many different things! Each child grows and develops along their own path, and each path is the proper path.

When you think about development paths at D4C, you may already be wondering which classroom your child may be in next. You may wonder if they will be the oldest in their classroom or the youngest. You may wonder how they will adjust to doing things so differently. You may wonder who the teachers will be and if they will be as wonderful as your current teachers. So much to wonder about. My best advise is to enjoy your child and their classroom right now. Look at articles from other classrooms and get an idea of what is next but realize that no matter where your child is next, the teachers will create a program unique to them!

Dawn will start the Fall enrollment process in mid-March by sending out a survey to ask about your fall scheduling needs. This starts a long process of placing children in their next classrooms. When we have all of the information that we need from current families, we do a rough sketch of where we think current children will be in the Fall. When we know the needs of current families, we then move to the waitlist to fill open spots in the older classrooms and enroll as many babies as we can.

It changes every year. Some years, the Black Bear Room is just right for the number of 4-year-old children we have. Some years we have too many 4-year-olds and we need to have some in the Badger Room as well. Some years we do not have enough 4-year-olds to fill the Black Bear Room, so we place some older 3-year-olds in there and they stay for 2 years. Some years all the Chickadees are ready to move on and there is space for them. Some years some of the Chickadees are too young to move on so they spend a second year in the Chickadee classrooms. Most often, Chickadees do not all move to the same classrooms. There are some Chickadees who are ready for the big leap to the Hedgehog Room and some who will thrive in the Owl room. Likewise, there are times when some Owls move to the Hedgehog Room and times when they jump right into the Otter Room. Each year, we look at individual children and what is best for them. I do consult with teachers if there are any children who may need some special consideration. If we are really torn about the best placement for your child, we will reach out to you to get your opinion (this happens most often for children who just miss the current kindergarten cut off age where they live).

I know that it sounds like a daunting process, but it always works out. We are so fortunate to have a staff who is able to work with a variety of ages and understands developmentally appropriate programming. Since returning from COVID, we have also developed a mindset that teachers can move from room to room if it seems appropriate as well. Flexibility, looking at the needs of individuals, and assessing the needs of the program as a whole, all work together to make each transition successful!

I hope that you all enjoy the newsletter this month. The next issue will be out in May!

We make sure that they get plenty of outside time, plenty of time to move their bodies, plenty of time to explore different themes and toys, plenty of time to figure things out by doing puzzles, using blocks and Duplos, plenty of time to develop friendships and figure out what to do when those friendships don't go just as you would hope that they would go, plenty of time to feel things and decide what we like to touch and what we don't like to touch. We also provide plenty of time to create. That's what we are focusing on in this newsletter.

You may marvel at all of the different activities that are out and inviting to the kids when they walk in each morning. We've heard more than one of you say, "I'm glad you do that here so we don't have to do it at home." We try really hard to always have an activity out that allows children to explore their creativity. We really try to focus on the process rather than the product. You will hear many teachers say that, but what does it mean? It means that the act of creating and exploring and doing is more important than what the finished product looks like.



Kids might spend more time looking at and feeling the paint or painting implement than actually putting paint on the paper. They are learning about the properties of the materials and figuring out just how they feel, look and function.

They might experiment with lots and lots of paint or glue. They are figuring out what happens when you add more and how things stick better.









They figure out different ways to put marks on paper using different tools and implements.



They learn cause and effect by noticing how the paint looks on their creation or how the glue causes one thing to stick to another.



They develop fine motor skills by holding a marker or using scissors.







They may find creativity in unusual materials.

They may be concerned with placement.





They may focus on one color



But whatever they choose to do, the process is all theirs and wonderful. Have a creative rest of the winter!



We can't believe we are on our second newsletter. Where is the time going!

The Badgers have grown so much over the past few months. We have learned to work together while playing and cleaning up. It has been so wonderful to hear phrases like "Can I have a turn when you're done?" become part of the children's independent vocabulary! Our Badgers are also big on helping the teachers prep and set up snacks, lunch and clean the tables off. Some of our friends have even been helping other children put on their outside clothes!











Over the past few months the Badgers have enjoyed music class with Brooke. Everyone is playing instruments, singing, and dancing. We have seen our friends explore new ways to use the instruments, learn many new songs, and become so much more expressive in their dance moves! Our Badgers are now a team of dancing Badgers.







We have had so much fun in our daily outside time, from playing, shoveling, sledding, building snow people, trying to get the snow to stick to the trees out on the playground (which they did, and turned them into snow people also). We have become more and more independent outside as well - pushing our own sleds down the hill and climbing back up without any teacher help (as long as the snow is slippery enough). We've learned a lot about snow as well! We have made a post office and a large mail truck out of boxes that we painted all together. Then we learned how the mail goes from here to there. In the process of that we have made letters to either family members or pets. As part of writing the letters to our family, we are learning the letters in our name and how to write them. They get so very excited when they accomplish this. It is not perfect and their letters may not be in the correct order but they are rolling right along with it. We have even started to see some of our friends teaching their friends the letters they know (I overheard one friend saying, "see this is an 'M,' it goes up-down-up-down" while looking at our foam letter blocks)! It turns out that the Badgers are not just exceptional learners they are also exceptional teachers as well!















We have story time with Sunnie and we get very excited when Friday is here for that. When the children see Sunnie in the building they stop to ask her if they will be having it this week. It is a special circle with lots of giggles and storytelling. Sunnie loves to include the children's ideas in her stories, so the Badgers always get a chance to help her out!

We've switched up the toys we have in our classroom several times, but one toy that has remained popular the whole year so far is our magna-tiles! Our friends have become master builders with the magna-tiles. They build towers that are almost as tall as they are, houses with many rooms and elaborate roofs, and even some traveling buildings on top of our magna-tile cars! While the teachers are often excited to build with them, this has been mostly a child-directed activity and another great example of the way that the Badgers learn from each other!

Children continue to enjoy our emergent curriculum learning about the themes and topics they are most interested in. ### **Encouraging Process Art at Home**

## Reaping the Benefits and Joy of Making

People often think about art as creating something beautiful—a replica *Starry Night* collage or a seasonal craft to serve as a gift. But when children engage in *process art*, they explore and experience materials without working toward a particular end product. In this case, going through the process of making art is more important than the results or outcomes.

There are many benefits to be gained from process art. It can be playful and joyful, and it nurtures having an open mind, trying new things, and building curiosity and resilience. It also requires minimal adult preparation.

You can encourage process art at home without being an artist yourself. And you don't need to go out and buy expensive art supplies. Instead, you can use materials from your home and from nature. Find a flat, roomy space where your child can work (a table, the floor, or even a grassy area can all be great working spaces), then set it with materials that will encourage open-ended exploration. Be sure to include

- items that can serve as a base for your child's work (cardboard, placemats, clay, or playdough)
- a variety of objects for your child to explore (paper plates, colored paper, beads, buttons, and natural materials such as sticks and leaves)
- something that will help your child connect those objects to their base and to each other (masking tape, glue, pipe cleaners)
- a variety of tools (scissors, various sized brushes, blunt-edged instruments to cut playdough or clay)

While your child creates, consider joining them. You can either work on your own art alongside them or ask to join in whatever they're making. While you don't need to talk the whole time, you can ask some key what, how, and why questions to help your child share what's on their mind as they make art. These could include

- > "What is your plan?"
- > "How will you make it happen?"
- > "Tell me more about why you chose this material?"

If your child is not ready to speak yet, you can put words to their actions by narrating what they are doing. ("I noticed that you stuck pipe cleaners into the playdough to make a birthday cake with candles. What a creative idea!")

Children often encounter challenges during process art. They may become frustrated because their work does not accurately reflect what they're thinking, or they might struggle with a technical issue, such as attaching a cardboard cylinder securely to a box. When this happens, wait: Give your child space to work through a problem and make mistakes along the way. If they ask for your help, acknowledge what they've done, break down the problem, then make a plan for some steps they can take to resolve it.

Stay open-minded about what your child is doing. Their creations might not be what you expect, but the real beauty lies in their journey of thought, exploration, and discovery.
