Sexual assault could include threats of force to get someone to engage in sexual behavior such as nonconsensual or unwanted touching; sexual penetration (vaginal or anal penetration, no matter how slight, with a body part or object), oral-to-genital contact, or attempts to engage in these behaviors. Sexual misconduct could include remarks about physical appearance or persistent sexual advances. These behaviors could be initiated by someone known or unknown, including someone you are in or have been in a relationship with.¹²
