From the Director

Summer and Fall enrollment

Friday, March 16 was the deadline for indicating your summer and fall child care needs. As much notice as you can give me of upcoming changes is helpful, but a 30 day notice is required to reduce your child's schedule or to withdraw. That gives me enough time to get another child on board. Remember that if I have at least 30 days' notice (more would be great) your child's space may be saved with a 50% holding fee for a summer absence of 4 consecutive weeks or more.

Once I have the surveys back, I'll start to construct fall class rosters. Getting everything to fit is a bit like a jigsaw puzzle, so it takes a while. I honestly don't know which children will go to which group and if there is to be an age cut-off, where it will be. It changes from year to year, so it's best not to assume that your child will be in one group or another. Well, if you have a kindergartner, you can be sure that s/he will be a Grizzly and if s/he was a Polar or a Woolly last year and is not going to kindergarten s/he will be in the same group this year. If you have questions, please feel free to talk with your child's teachers, Sunnie or me.

Dear Big Jeff,

My child couldn't have her lunch last week because I forgot to put a "nut free note" in her lunch box. Isn't there some way around this? I don't even know if there is a child allergic to peanuts in her room.

Dear Nuts,

Um, no. There isn't a way around it. There are several children in the building with nut and peanut allergies whose allergic reactions can be life threatening. We take that pretty seriously! It can take only the tiniest amount of an allergen to trigger a reaction. Nut allergies are particularly challenging because so many foods have nuts hidden in them or are processed in plants where nuts are present. When the children are older they will be able to manage their own consumption, but in the meantime it's our job. Peanut butter

is a special challenge because it sticks so nicely to everything. One child with a PB&J sandwich can spread peanut butter through the center pretty quickly.

If I had any question about the wisdom of a nut-free policy, I was convinced when I attended the Food Allergy Support Group at DHMC for parents and caregivers of children with food allergies. Our challenges in being nut-free in a controlled environment for part of the day paled in comparison to families' challenges in keeping their children safe and healthy every day, everywhere.

One way I know how vigilant we have to be and how we have to support each other's efforts is through the mistakes I've made. More than once, sadly, I've picked up a package of something at the grocery store, scanned the label and decided it was nut-free only to have a teacher send it back to me, because I had missed something on the label. Now that's embarrassing!

So, here's the drill, every day:

- -no peanuts, no tree nuts, no food containing nut products or processed in a plant where tree nuts or peanuts are present.
- -send foods in their original packaging with label intact or send a note indicating "Nut free"
- -check every package, even if it's a brand that is usually nut free manufacturers changes ingredients, processes and processing plants without notice.

We have been introducing new art experiences to the teddies. Finger painting was a big hit with Owen painting three pictures. Grace even did a one finger method, poking and moving the finger paint around.



We mixed cornstarch and water to make "goop". Kirsten would say, "goopy" as she dipped her hands in it while Yirang wanted more and more of the mixture to move around on a tray.

When we write daily sheets Cleo comes right over to us to grab the paper. She loves to "write" on the sheets.



Often we give the children paper on a clipboard with chubby crayons. Kellyn will sit and make several pictures and Remi will come over to join her. Play dough is another favorite activity. Carter will try to roll balls with the dough. Dara will poke at it and hold some to squeeze.

Emily is being introduced to crayons and coloring.

Play dough and painting are two ways we explore fine motor skills, expand vocabulary and learn to follow directions. To the teddy's it is just pure fun!

Here is our favorite play dough recipe to try at home:

1 cup Flour
1/2 cup Salt
2 tablespoons oil
2 teaspoons cream of tartar
food coloring
1 cup water

Mix all ingredients except for water Heat water to boiling in the microwave and add to dry ingredients Mixture will be soupy at first, but will firm up while stirring Enjoy!

When it was sixty degrees out the other day we had a blast playing in the puddles. We haven't been able to predict what the weather will bring us, but we like to be ready whatever comes our way. This month we have been enjoying some more art activities. Painting is a favorite for most of the toddlers, although we have a few that don't really care for it yet, and would rather be paying with other toys. Some toddlers get right into it with their paintbrushes or hands spreading paint liberally around on their paper, while others take a more tentative and slower approach. Each child is able to approach these activities in their own way each doing what feels right to them.

Music class continues to be a fun time for the Teddies that are participating. We are also singing and doing songs in our classroom. Songs with lots of hand gestures like "Open Shut Them", "Itsy, Bitsy Spider" and "Twinkle, Twinkle" are favorites. Greeting Koala Families,

First let me just say how thankful we all are about the fact that the ice has melted from our Playground. It is crucial that we get out each and every day, and the ice has made it a little difficult. Some children have actually taken to riding bikes on the is now an exposed bike path. Who's ready for spring? Say I.

We have spent a great deal of time exploring different textures and how they feel. In the Area of arts and crafts we have done various types of painting. The children really enjoyed painting with tinfoil. The tinfoil felt hard and smooth as it was crinkled and made different textures on the paper.

We play with play dough often, but it is amazing if you give the children pebbles to mix in how the

contrast of hard and soft makes it a whole new experience. One of the favorite sensory activities was the process of making "clean Mud". On this one I gotta say it was a toss-up as to who had more fun me or your children. Now I know parents say they're glad we do the messy stuff at daycare so



they don't feel the need at home, but this is a great and easy rainy day project. Take clean (duh) toilet paper, have your child help you shred it into many fine pieces. Shave a couple bars of white ivory soap, your children could use butter knives. Mix it all with warm water and TADA. The more you play with it the more it really does begin to feel like mud. It works great at a table on a tray. We used it with scoops and different cups one day but added snakes and bugs the next. Give it a try......There were squares of different textures such as sand paper, felt, and faux fur presented to the children to glue on paper in any way they felt was the right way. Check out the wall of our textured collages.







What would exploring textures be without literally emerging yourself in them? We created a tunnel that was covered with fur as well as on the floor of the tunnel in which to crawl through. I could not fit through but all indications were that it was fun. The children were a pile of enthusiastic laughter as they took turns going through.

Our circle times have also exposed Koalas to the idea of thinking how different things around us feel. Bobbie Lynn did a great game of putting different objects in a bag and having children guess what they were feeling without seeing it first. They were really good at it. It was a little surprising the one item that stumped them was a crayon. I exchanged our library books which had different topics such as furry monsters and gooey mud,

Gladness had a wonderful project of taking out several items that had different shapes sizes, and textures. They were just given the freedom to look using magnifying glasses at them however long and whichever pieces they wanted to.

So in a nutshell that is only a small sampling of some of the things we have done recently in the Koala Room. I think when we do a topic such as exploring textures it is a good reminder to teachers to think about the environment around us. Stop, feel and smell the roses. There are interesting and different things that we see every day but forget to take a moment to enjoy them. It is great to have so many materials available to us but there are things around us every day that is a wonderful learning opportunity. Let children feel bread before toasting it. How did it feel how does it feel now sort of thing.

They were such a helpful group and particularly enjoyed showing them around and sharing their space and materials with

these preschoolers. Another day, the whole group went to the multi together for some parachute games and to play a musical movement game called Hullabaloo. Throughout the week, the children were excited to have extra time in the room to construct with the space legos as well as use the jungle animals with a variety of manipulatives. With the continued fascination with sled dogs and endless pretending, we topped off our week by viewing the Disney movie of "Snow Dogs". We were saddened that we didn't get any snow for some of our outdoor planned activities but that didn't stop us from having fun out there and it turned out that we got some snow the following week anyway! And finally...we got to go sledding on the BIG hill!!!

When we all were back together after vacation we recognized Dr. Seuss's birthday on March 2nd. We have read, and continue to read, many of his books. Inspired by his rhymes, humor and imagination, we are playing many rhyming games and using our own imaginations. With an array of materials, unique and unusual "creatures" are being constructed that look like they could have jumped right out of a Dr. Seuss book! Fun is being had with our Toobers and Zots and being turned into creative and silly masterpieces. We hope to begin creating some of our own imaginative stories too!

Imaginative play drives our days here in the Grizzly Room. This type of play allows children the chance to leave the here and now to try on different roles and feelings and to practice social and cognitive skills- all while having fun in the wonderful world of "What If...". Imagination is a realm of adventures and surprises! Grizzlies are masterful at creating their own props needed for make-believe. They also thrive on decorating the environment to set the appropriate feel for their play. A great deal of purposeful thinking goes into these creations, as well as the skill required in order to make these props. The joy of creating something is exhilarating! The creative thinking and personal emotion combine into an individual's artistic expression- a kind of expression where there is no right or wrong. Children are free to experience satisfaction without a set of rules or expectations for outcomes!

With a post office/store set up in our room and an interest in making money, we have been learning about money. Learning about money is an abstract and complicated concept for young children for several reasons. Having more coins doesn't necessarily mean having more money; larger coins aren't always worth more than smaller ones; and the names of coins have no logical connection to their value. By playing games and doing a variety of repetitious and playful activities with this fascination of money, the Grizzlies are having firsthand experiences that help them to identify coins and begin to learn these concepts. We can only wish that money grew on trees or all it took was a green piece of paper and a marker to create real money! Some of our stories have helped the Grizzlies realize how hard families work to earn their dollars and all the important things they spend their money on that supports the family in so many different ways. After reading the story If You Made a Million by David M. Schwartz the Grizzlies were asked what they would do or buy if they had a million dollars and here are their responses:

Henry C.: I would buy a castle and be the king of the world.

Henry W.: I would buy all the lego sets ever made.

Ian: I would become the owner of a football stadium.

Rhea: I would put it in the bank and save it.

Cynthia: I would buy a lot of books because I love to read and I would buy a puppy.

Nina: I would give half of it to poor people and the rest I would use to buy cats.

Elena: I would use it to buy art stuff.

Pilar: I would go on a trip to Mexico and also buy a jewel.

Gabriel: I'd give half of it to poor people and then pay someone to train a dolphin so I could ride on it.

Matthew T.: I would buy a spaceship and take a trip to outer space.

Michael: I would buy a castle.

Matthew J.: I would buy food for my family and for other people who need it. **Katie:** I would buy a lot of candy and lots of My Little Ponies and new stuffies.

Aaron: I would buy all of the legos in the world.

Ryder: I would buy all the star wars toys.

Andrew: I would buy some nerf guns and lightsabers. If I still had enough money I would buy an iphone.

Noah: I would buy all of the Star Wars action figures in the world.
