## Transferring Audio Cassettes to CD



Audio cassette players are located in the Edit Rooms on the west side of Jones Media Center. IMPORTANT: All media projects must be compliant with current Dartmouth College Policy and Federal Copyright laws. - 1. Setting up the tape deck:
  - Turn on the **MASTER POWER** switch for the equipment rack (red light).
  - Turn on the **Cassette** deck and insert the tape. On the deck, choose the following settings: Dolby Select the type that matches your tape.

Tape - Select the type, usually "Normal"

- 2. Cue the tape you can search for audio manually by fast-forwarding/rewinding and pressing Play on the tape deck. Plug headphones in to the tapedeck outlet to listen and find the starting point.
- 3. Launch GarageBand from the dock, then set up for recording:
  - In the GB menu, select FILE >NEW. In the popup window select Empty Project and click the Choose button in the lower right.
  - In the input window select the microphone icon to create an Audio project recorded using the computer's Line In connection.
  - To select Input/Output, click on the arrow and in the Preferences window, set Output Device to Built-in Output, and Input Device to USB Audio Codec. Click Create.
  - Turn off the count-in and metronome by clicking the icons at the top of the screen.



- 4. To test and set the input volume, plug headphones in to the Rolls amplifier:
  - Set the **Input and Output levels** on the tape deck to 5 or 6, so that the VU meter on the tape deck is peaking at about -2 dB.
  - While the tape is playing, adjust the Recording Level slider on the track so that at its loudest, the audio peaks at the top of the



green and into the yellow zone of the meter, without going into the red. If you adjust the Recording Level slider to its maximum and your recording is still too quiet, you can adjust the **Output level** knob on the tape deck to increase the input volume.

5. Press the **Record** button at the top of the screen.





- Press Play on the tape deck. The GarageBand track will show the audio waveform as it is recorded. When your selection has finished, press Stop on the tape deck, then press the Record button again in GarageBand to end recording.
- 6. To save your file:
  - Click on the **Cycle Region** button—it will light up yellow.





- A yellow bar will appear above the track.
- Click and drag in this space to select a region, highlighted by a yellow bar. Move and resize the
  yellow bar by dragging the edit points at each end until it corresponds with the segment you
  would like to export.
- Select Export Song to Disk from the Share menu. We reccomend AIFF as the file type.
   Check Export cycle area and click Export.
- Repeat this step for each track you wish to save as a separate track.
- 7. Burn tracks to a CD with iTunes.
  - In iTunes, add the tracks you saved to the Library (File > Add to Library...).
  - Create a playlist (**Plus** button at left bottom) and click **Edit Playlist**. Add tracks in the order you want them to appear on the CD.
  - To burn your playlist to a CD, insert disc (CDs can be purchased at the Media Services desk). Click the cog wheel in the bottom left corner and select **Burn Playlist to CD**. Click **Burn**.
