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### COOPERATIVE INSTITUTIONAL RESEARCH PROGRAM (CIRP) FRESHMAN SURVEY

- The CIRP Freshman Survey is a national longitudinal study administered by the Higher Education Research Institute (HERI) at University of California at Los Angeles (UCLA).
- It is regarded as one of the most comprehensive sources of information on incoming college students in America.



## **SURVEY BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

- In the fall of 2010, 77% (n=879/1,143) of the incoming first-year class at Dartmouth participated in the CIRP Freshman Survey during First-Year Orientation.
- A <u>paper-and-pencil survey</u>, the instrument covers a wide range of topics including demographics, pre-college experiences, reasons for attending college, academic plans, personal opinions and beliefs, financial aid status, and parental background.



- This presentation provides some characteristics of Dartmouth first-year students including their reasons for choosing Dartmouth, financial concerns, selfratings, life goals, and expectations of their college career.
- This information can be used to better understand our students so we can further develop an educational environment that fosters their academic and personal success.



## RESPONDENT CHARACTERISTICS

- 49% of the Dartmouth respondents identified as male and 51% as female.
- Racial/ethnic composition of respondents (n=838) was:

• White: **57%** 

• Asian-American: 17%

• Hispanic: 6%

• African-American: 5%

• International: **7%** 

• Native American/Hawaiian: 4%

• Multiracial: 4%

 14% of Dartmouth respondents reported that English is not their native language






## **COLLEGE CHOICE**

#### Q: Is this college your...?

#### Dartmouth was:

- The first college choice for 68% of the respondents.
- The second college choice for 16% of the respondents.






## **TOP RANKED REASONS**

### Q: How important was each reason in your decision to come here?

Top ranked reasons for attending Dartmouth:

- Academic reputation of the College (100%)
- Graduates getting good jobs (94%)
- Wanted to attend school this size (92%)






## **PARENTAL INCOME**

## Reported household income:

- 32% above \$250,000
- 50% above \$150,000
- *15%* below \$50,000






## FINANCIAL RESOURCES

## Q: How much of your first year's educational expense from the sources listed below?

For first-year students, the majority of resources (\$10,000 or above) come from:

- Family (74%)
- Non-repayable grants/scholarship (38%)
- Repayable loans (5%)






## **CONCERN REGARDING ABILITY TO FINANCE EDUCATION**

The ability to finance their college education was:

- A **major** concern for 5% of the respondents
- **NOT** a concern for *51%* of the respondents






## INFLUENCE OF FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE ON ENROLLMENT DECISIONS

#### The Importance of Financial Assistance in Admission Decisions

Financial assistance was a **very important** consideration in enrollment decisions for:

- 31% of respondents whose first choice was Dartmouth
- 43% of respondents whose second choice was Dartmouth





## **RANKED SELF-RATINGS**


#### Q: Rate yourself on the following traits as compared to an average person your age.

#### Top self-rated traits:

- Academic ability (95%)
- Drive to achieve (90%)
- Work with diverse people (83%)

#### Lowest self-rated traits:

- Spirituality (32%)
- Artistic ability (33%)
- Computer skills (33%)






## **USE OF TIME**

Q: During your last year in high school, how much time did you spend during a typical week on the following activities?

During their last year in high school:

- 43% spent 11 hours or more per week in socializing with friends
- 44% spend 11
   hours or more per
   week in exercise
   or sports
- 33% spent 16 hours or more per week studying






## **PARTICIPATION IN VARIOUS ACTIVITIES**

Q: Indicate the frequency of participating in each of the activities below during the last year?

# The most frequent activities were:

- Socializing with someone from another racial/ethnic group (98%)
- Asking a teacher for advice after class (94%)
- Performing volunteer work (93%)
- Discussing politics (93%)






## **ACTIVE LEARNING BEHAVIOR**

#### Q: How often in the past year did you...

During their high school senior year, Dartmouth respondents frequently:

- Supported opinions with a logical argument (83%)
- Sought solutions to problems and explained them to others (77%)
- Integrated skills and knowledge from different resources and experiences (76%)






## **ACADEMIC DEGREE ASPIRATION**


**90%** of the Dartmouth respondents planned on getting an advanced degree.

**88%** reported that the highest degree they would obtain at Dartmouth would be a bachelor's.

## **INTENDED CAREERS**

Around **22%** of the Dartmouth respondents had not decided on a career.

One in six (17%) planned on being a physician and one in nine (11%) anticipated becoming a business executive.

## **RANKED LIFE GOALS**


#### Q: What is the importance to you of each of the following?

#### Top ranked life goals:

- Raise a family (74%)
- Help others (74%)
- Understand other cultures (69%)

### Lowest ranked life goals

- Create artistic work (13%)
- Be accomplished in performing arts (19%)
- Write original work (20%)






## **RANKED COLLEGE EDUCATION EXPECTATION**

Q: In deciding to go to college, how important to you was each of the following?

Top ranked expectations for college education:

- Learn more about things that interest me (100%)
- Gain a general education and appreciation of ideas (100%)
- Get a better job (97%)
- Become a more cultured person (97%)





## **RANKED COLLEGE LIFE EXPECTATIONS**


#### Q: What is your best guess at the chances you will:

#### Respondents are very likely to:

- Socialize with students from another race/ethnicity (85%)
- Be satisfied with Dartmouth (81%)
- Discuss courses with students outside of class (76%)

#### Respondents are very **unlikely** to:

- Need extra time for degree (4%)
- Work full-time in college (2%)
- Transfer to another college (1%)





## **SUMMARY**

- Most first-year students (68%) indicated that Dartmouth College was their first choice.
- The top three reasons for attending Dartmouth are academic reputation, graduates getting good jobs, and wanting to attend a school of this size.
- More than 80% of Dartmouth incoming students rated themselves, compared to an average person of their age, as <u>above average</u> or in the <u>highest 10%</u> in academic ability, drive to achieve, ability to work with diverse people, tolerance of others, and seeing others' perspectives.



## **SUMMARY - CONTINUED**

- 50% of Dartmouth incoming students reported that their parents' total income was \$150,000 or more.
- 51% of Dartmouth incoming students reported <u>no</u> <u>concern</u> regarding their ability to finance college education.
- During their last year in high school, over 40% of Dartmouth students spent more than 11 hours a week socializing with friends, while over 30% studied more than 16 hours in a typical week.



## **SUMMARY - CONTINUED**

- 90% of Dartmouth incoming students planned on getting an advanced degree.
- More than 70% of Dartmouth incoming students think there is a very good chance they will discuss courses outside of class, participate in student groups, be satisfied with Dartmouth, and socialize with students from another race/ethnicity.
- The <u>top reasons</u> to attend college for Dartmouth firstyear students were learning things that interests them, gaining a general education and appreciation of ideas, getting a good job, and becoming a more cultured person.
